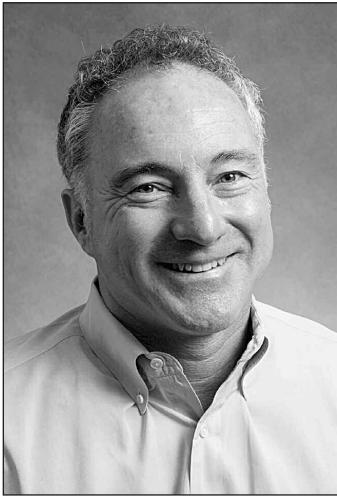

From ***Gerard F. Keating***, President, Board of Directors:

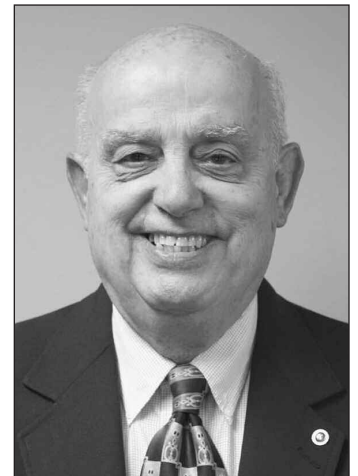

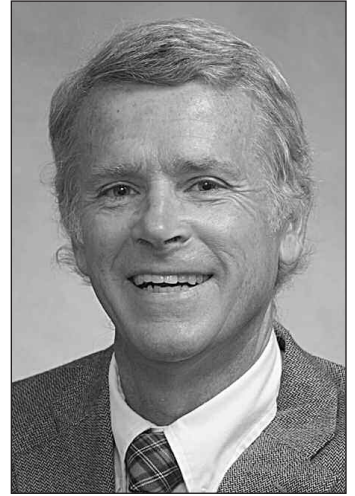

JULY 1, 2009 – JUNE 30, 2010

## **ACCOMPLISHMENTS:**

***Serenity House / CORS Merger*** – As a result of the extended commitment and due diligence of the governing boards of both Serenity House and CORS, the formal merger of the organizations occurred on July 1, 2010. The integration of clinical, administrative and programmatic services has transpired rather seamlessly. This merger is a tribute to the commitment to the enhancement of our community service system by both organizations and through the support, encouragement and guidance of our community partners - the Department of Children and Families, United Way of Volusia-Flagler Counties and Volusia County.

***Correctional Intervention Program / Justice Assistance Funding*** – Effective October 1, 2009, the Volusia County Council voted unanimously to approve \$278,835 in new Justice Assistance (JAG) funding for a new correctional intervention/treatment program. Our agency also received \$48,757 in additional JAG funding to expand our Family Drug Court program. The jail diversion/treatment program was successfully implemented and an evaluation of project outcomes is being conducted by One Voice for Volusia. An Advisory Council that oversees the operations of this program includes representatives of the justice system, treatment partners and community advocates.

***BRAIVE Foundation Funding*** – In August 2009, United Way of Volusia and Flagler was awarded a \$240,000 grant through the BRAIVE Foundation to expand mental health and substance abuse treatment access to Iraqi and Afghanistan war veterans and their families. Our agency was designated to provide access to residential treatment for targeted veterans and their family members. Our residential services funded through this grant were at 100% capacity within two weeks of the award and our funding was earned within the first five months of operation. The Foundation has agreed to significantly increase Haven Recovery funding for residential services based upon established need. A BRAIVE client, a veteran of the Iraqi conflict, was prominently featured in an article published in the Daytona Beach News Journal in September 2009.

***Public Support / Donations*** – Our agency again experienced a positive year in generating community support for those we serve. Through a partnership with Daytona International Speedway, a suite was donated to us to generate funds from community supporters at the Coke Zero 400 race. Our Women's residential program coordinated access to approximately \$7,000 in furniture donations from an area Holiday Inn to be used in our residential and housing facilities. Local American Legion Posts raised over \$10,000 to provide items for our agency's veterans. Over \$320,000 of in-kind and cash donations contributed to our mission and our Harley fundraiser's success continued by raising \$327,963. Individual donors provided \$67,732 in additional cash donations. This funding provides matching money for several of our grants and allows Haven Recovery Center to provide access to care for indigent individuals in need of services.

***VA Service Expansion*** – Our senior management staff have worked with administrative staff of the Orlando VA Medical Center to insure that funding support was maintained during a recent transfer of VA contract management. Due to the growing demand in meeting the complex needs of veterans, contracts with the VA now generate over \$575,000 to support specialized treatment for military veterans.

***Neighborhood Stabilization Funding*** – In September 2009, the agency received an award of \$1,136,517 in Neighborhood Stabilization funding from Volusia County. Our staff has worked closely with County staff in identifying, purchasing and initiating renovation of properties within targeted census tracts in both East and West Volusia. As our cost impact studies clearly indicate, access to supportive housing after treatment is a key factor in successful long term recovery.

**HUD / Good Samaritan Grants** – In December, over \$575,000 was awarded by HUD for continuation of several of the agency’s homeless housing and treatment programs. We also received \$138,885 in new “Good Samaritan” funding to expand our housing resources for homeless and chronically homeless families. The impact of this housing is of significant value to our community in our efforts to interrupt the cycle of homelessness, substance abuse and despair.

**CARF Survey** – In January, the agency’s programs were surveyed to determine if our organization continued to meet CARF accreditation standards. In February, we were notified that we had been awarded a full three-year accreditation of all programs surveyed. We received an “exemplary” citation for our cost-impact study. Subsequent to the merger, CARF also approved the inclusion of the residential and outpatient programs formerly operated by CORS under the umbrella of Haven Recovery Center’s accreditation.

**Federal Support** – While advocating for additional resources in Washington D.C, Randy Croy was hosted by Congressman John Mica at the Capitol and secured his commitment to continue working closely with us in expanding services for veterans. In addition, Randy met with veterans’ liaisons for Senators Nelson and LeMieux and Representatives Brown and Kosmas. Each liaison expressed support and pledged assistance for our efforts to expand care for veterans. A meeting was also held with Pete Dougherty, the Director of the VA’s national homeless veterans programming, who expressed his continued support for our efforts and interest in visiting our programs.

**City of Daytona Beach HUD Allocation** – In June 2010, the Daytona Beach City Commission approved a \$100,000 allocation to rehabilitate our Tanglewood Avenue facility. We will be converting the facility into four permanent housing apartments for low-income, special needs’ families. Women military veterans with children will be a high priority for placement in the apartments. A community supporter has expressed interest in purchasing and donating a vacant lot near the facility for additional parking and recreational space for residents of the facility.

**Public Education** – Efforts to increase the public’s awareness of the benefits of treatment and the impact of our services continue:

- Staff presentations to multiple neighborhood and community groups;
- Submission of op-ed pieces to the Daytona Beach News Journal regarding the need for continued state support of our substance abuse system of care;
- Testimony before Florida’s House Health Care Appropriations Committee in Tallahassee regarding the positive findings from the Serenity House cost impact study;
- Our criminal justice staff have conducted trainings for the judiciary, state attorneys, public defenders and criminal defense attorneys of the 7th Judicial Circuit regarding the role of treatment in diverting targeted offenders;
- Training for members of the faith community on “Conducting Comprehensive Substance Abuse Assessments”

## **OPPORTUNITIES:**

**Deltona/SW Volusia Service Expansion** – Management staff have recently met with the City of Deltona’s Planning Director and Director of Community Programs to explore opportunities to expand services in Southwest Volusia. Deltona is significantly underserved by human service providers and we foresee a significant opportunity to partner with Deltona in developing additional supportive housing and treatment options for residents of this area.

***Women Veterans*** – There is growing documentation of an increased demand for substance abuse and mental health treatment for female veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. Currently, access to care for these women is limited. There appears to be future opportunities to work with the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Department of Defense in expanding services targeted to serve this underserved population.

***Offender Diversion*** – Florida, like many states, is recognizing that merely constructing more prison and jail beds does not solve the problem of crime. Based upon effective models implemented in other states as well as outcome data from Florida’s Department of Corrections, new strategies to target and divert selected offenders from incarceration to treatment offers a smarter, more cost-effective approach to this issue.

***Collaboration*** – As securing new treatment funding becomes more challenging, it is more essential for organizations with similar missions to develop partnerships to increase efficiencies and reduce duplication of effort. The Haven Recovery Center Board of Directors remains committed to expanding our collaborative partnerships with local providers such as Halifax Medical Center, Palmer Chiropractic College, Stewart-Marchman-Act, West Volusia Hospital Authority, the Neighborhood Center, the House Next Door, the Homeless Coalition, and the Behavioral Health Consortium in enhancing our community’s service system.

***Health Care Reform*** – With recent passage of national health care reform, Haven Recovery Center is positioned to provide cost-effective treatment and intervention services to high utilizers of publicly-funded health care. We are actively exploring partnerships with medical and behavioral health providers to insure that our service system is a functional element of a holistic approach to health and wellness.

***UCF Social Work Program Partnership*** – Through the efforts of several staff members, our organization has developed an excellent partnership with UCF’s School of Social Work. UCF has designated Haven Recovery Center as one of only two “Signature” programs in Florida. We currently have four masters level social work interns providing over 50 hours per week of excellent clinical service to clients in various programs and will be working with the faculty and graduate students on a new cost impact study.

## **CHALLENGES:**

***Managing Entity Legislation*** – During the past session, the Florida legislature passed legislation which requires areas throughout the state to develop plans to provide for an integrated network of managed mental health and substance abuse services. It is crucial that we work closely with our area’s partner agencies to insure that changes in our service structure don’t impact upon clients’ access to quality care.

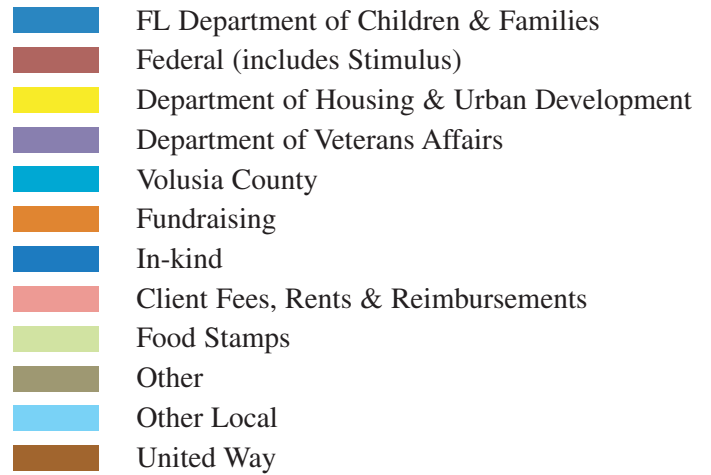
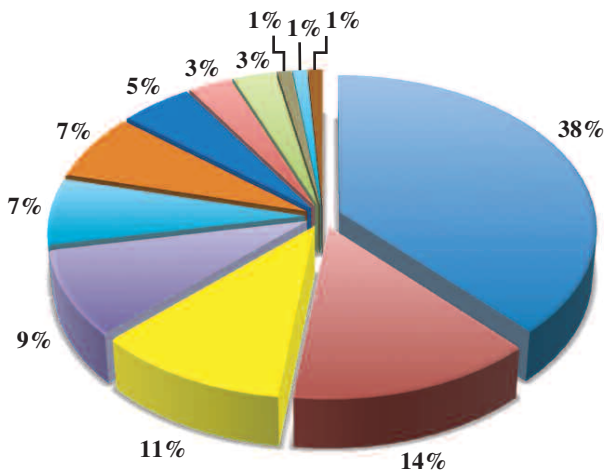
***Affordable Housing*** – Every community is experiencing difficulty in providing adequate affordable housing for working poor and homeless populations. In addition, individuals historically considered part of the middle class are having difficulty accessing safe, affordable housing. In a nation of substantial wealth and resources, we must address this challenge in order to achieve a desirable quality of life in our communities.

***Succession Planning*** – In the field of behavioral health, a generation of professionals who entered the field in the 1970’s are nearing retirement. As this generation “matures out” of the field, organizations like Haven Recovery Center need to be preparing to provide a smooth and orderly transition to a new cadre of managers and executives.

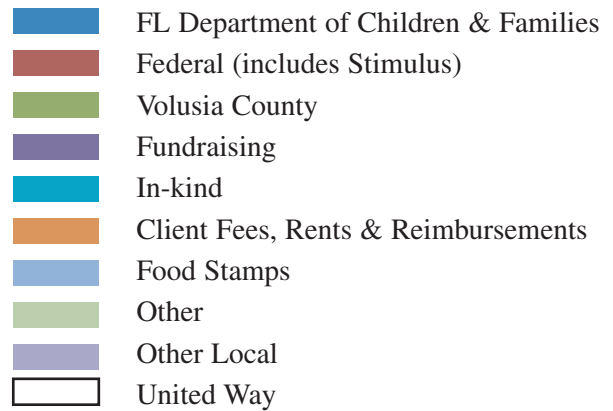
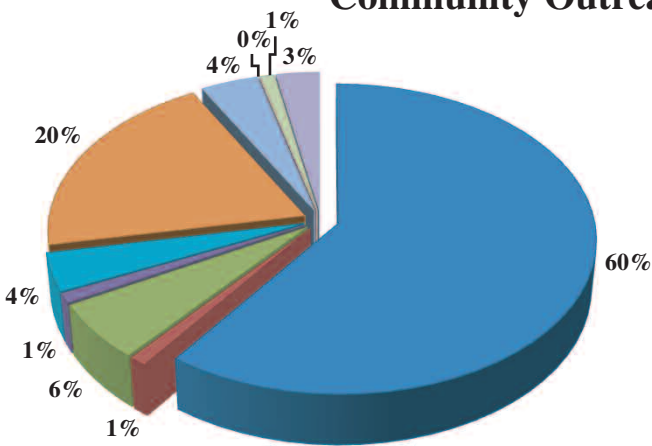

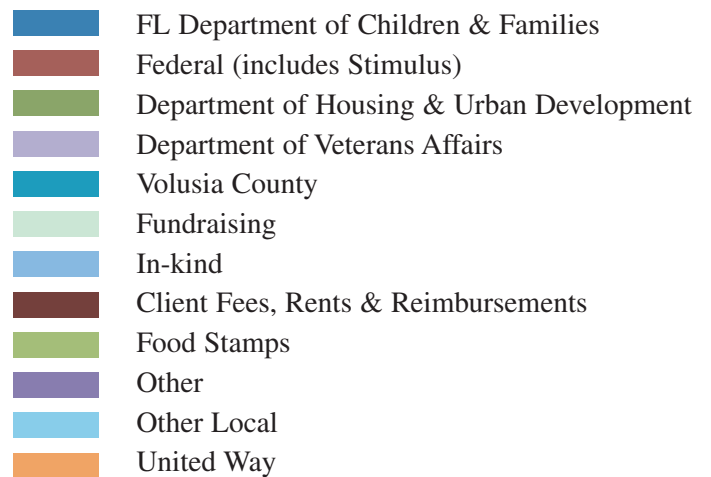
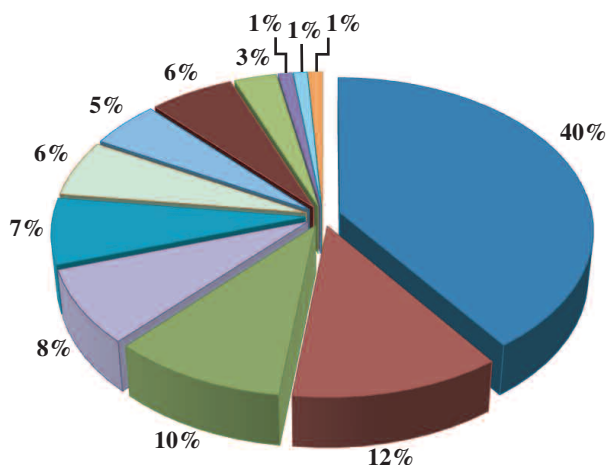
## Serenity House as of 6/30/10



## Community Outreach Services as of 6/30/10

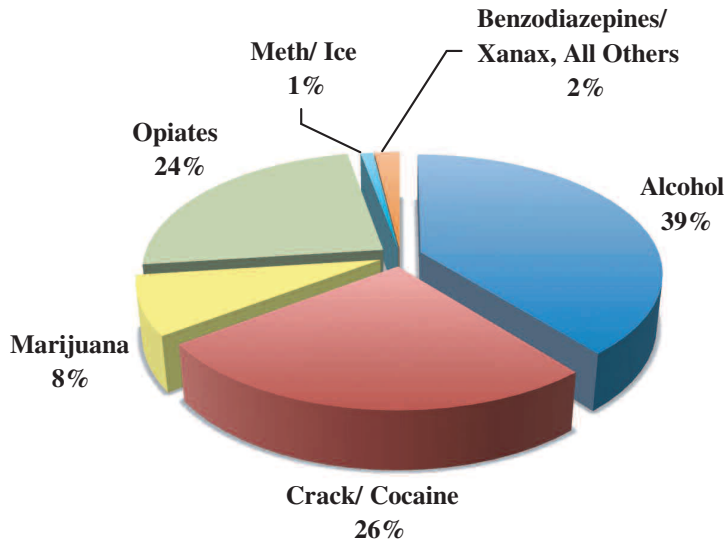


## Combined Agencies as of 6/30/10

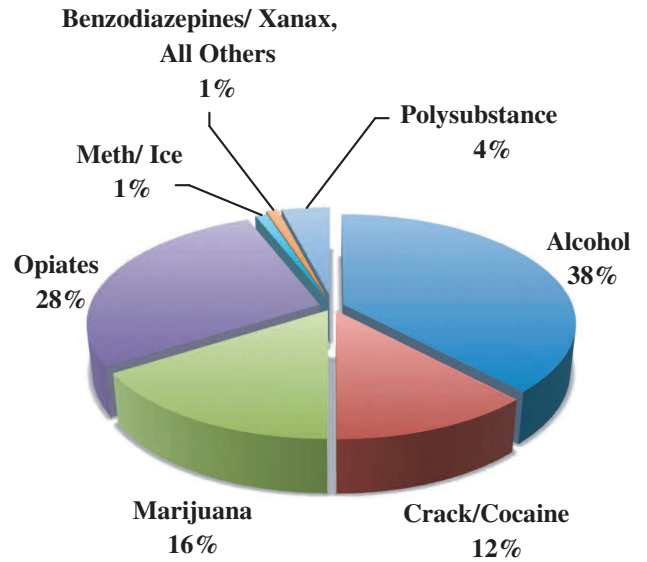


# Admissions by Drug of Choice

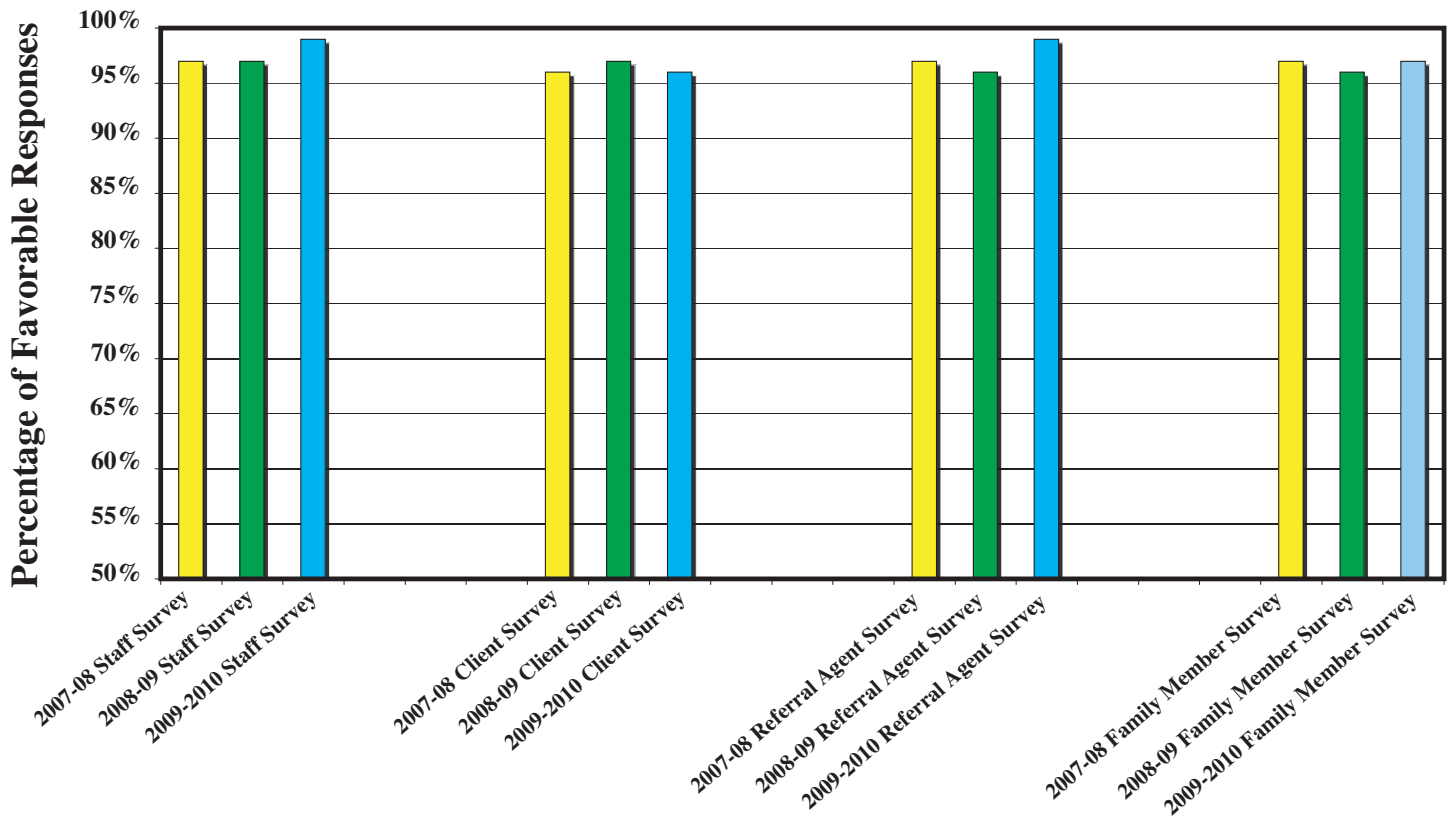
**Serenity House

(All Admissions FY 09-10)**

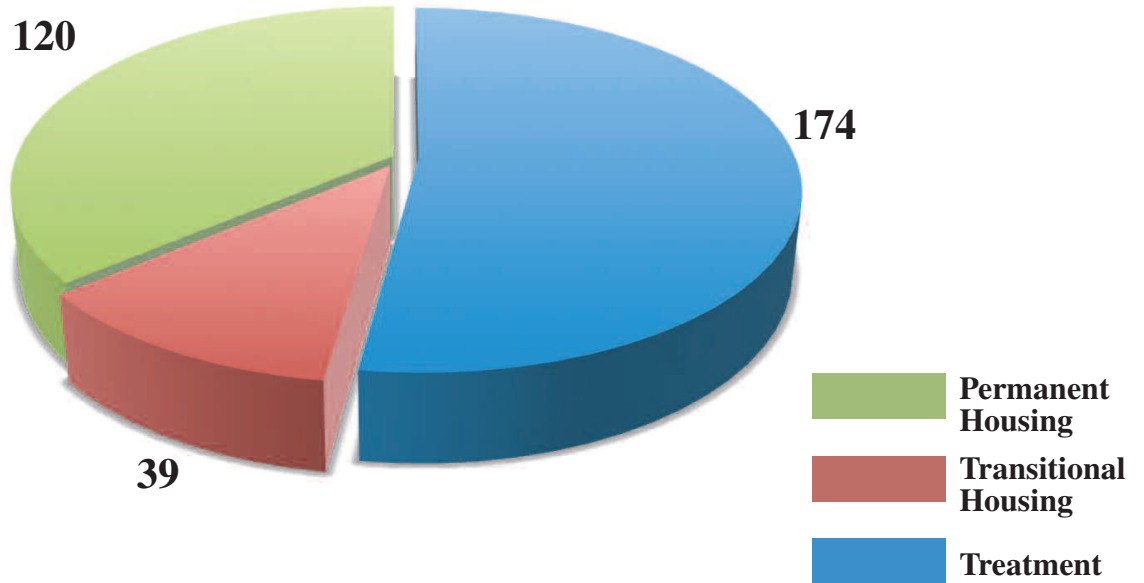

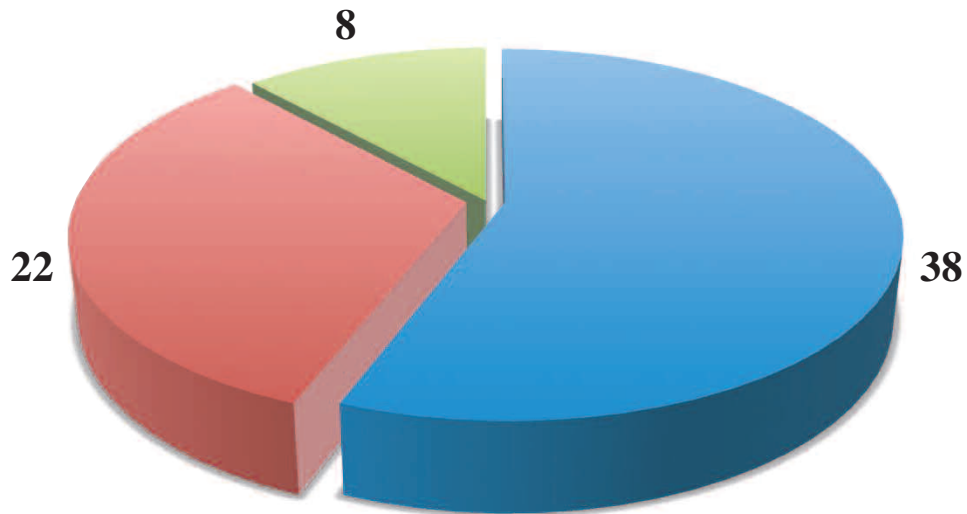


# Housing Data\*

System of Care - Total Beds = 333

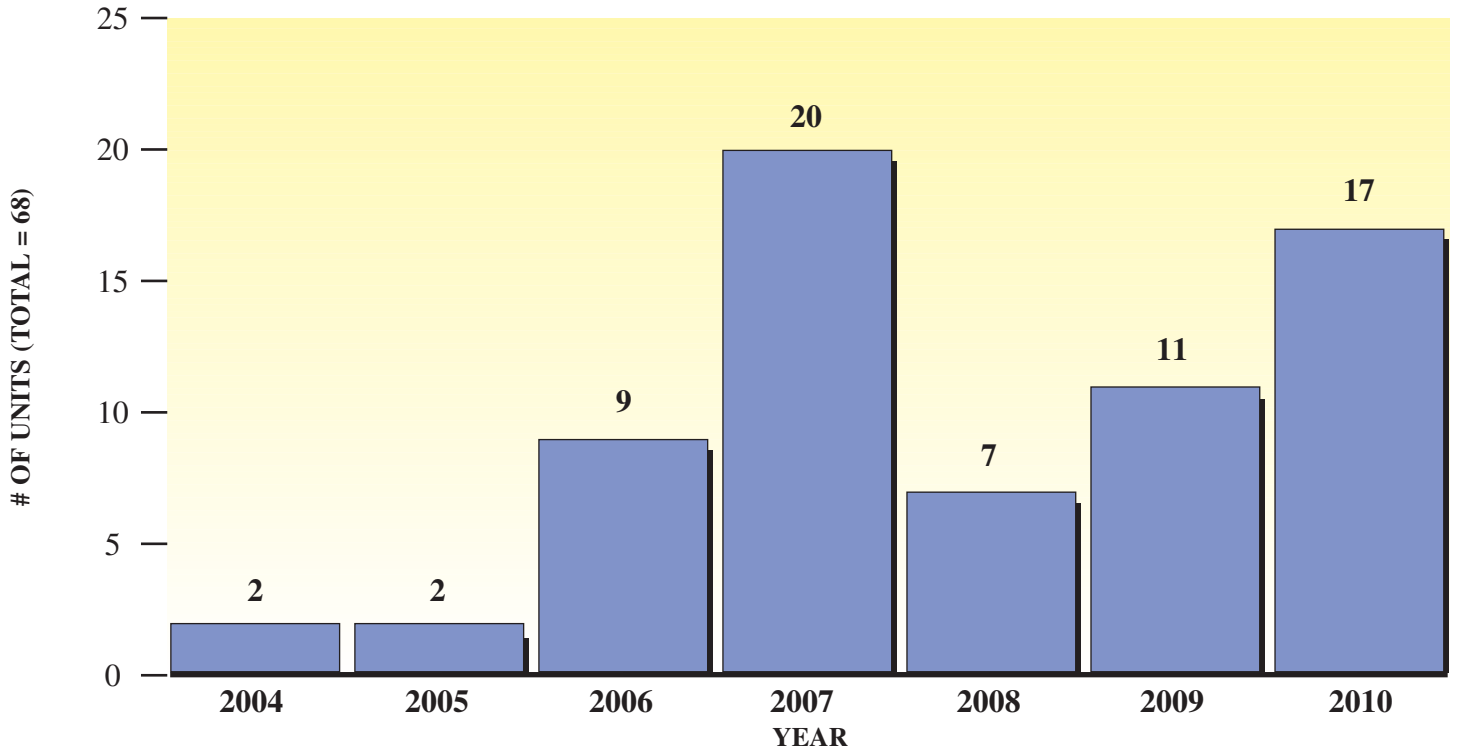


## Total Housing Units by Funding Type

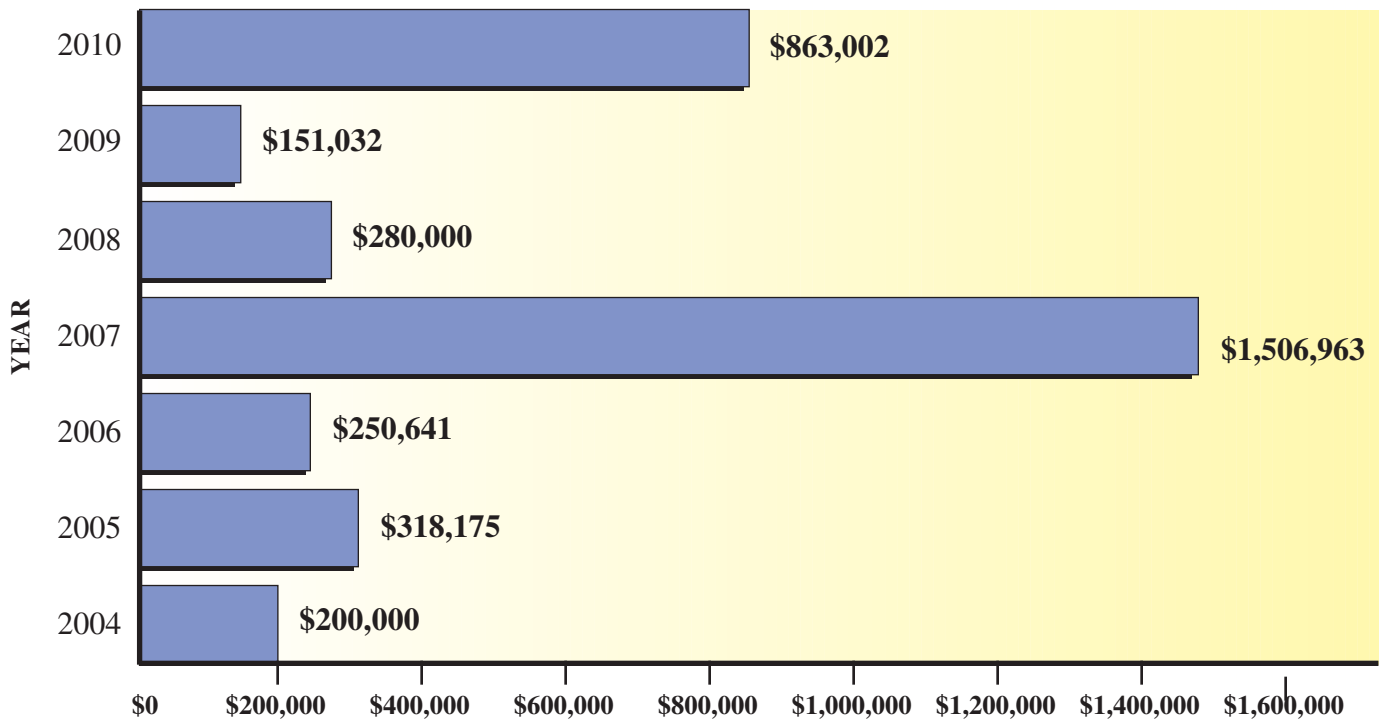

Haven Recovery Center provides comprehensive screening services for individuals who are seeking services in order to identify the complexity, severity and duration of their addiction and/or mental health disorders, and can be provided via face to face or telephone contact. Assessment services provide a comprehensive evaluation that identifies the strengths, needs, abilities, and preferences of the person seeking services. Screening and assessment services are available at multiple locations, including off-site in correctional facilities, hospital emergency rooms, or other locations.

Outpatient Counseling programs are CARF-accredited, DCF licensed services that provide substance abuse services for individuals age 18 and older. Services are provided at multiple locations in Volusia County and includes individual, group, family and psychoeducational counseling. Psychoeducational services include substance abuse education, family dynamics, relationships, coping skills, self-esteem, social functioning, anger management, family education, relapse prevention, etc. Supportive services are also available in the Outpatient Program for individuals after completing a residential component.

## **Women with Dependent Children Supportive Housing and Treatment**

Provides day treatment, aftercare, relapse prevention and supportive services for women whose needs can be met in a therapeutically supportive living environment.

## **Serenity West – Residential Treatment Center**

“Serenity West” is a CARF-accredited, DCF licensed Level II long term residential program for adult males, age 18 and older. With a capacity of 50 clients, this program serves the homeless, incarcerated drug offenders, and veterans, utilizing a modified therapeutic community model to assist individuals who meet criteria for treatment. In addition to individual counseling and psychoeducational substance abuse group therapy, the clinical team provides core group therapy in Anger Management, Relapse Prevention and Moral Reconciliation Therapy treatment.

## **Women’s Co-occurring Residential Treatment Center**

A CARF-accredited, DCF licensed Level II and III residential treatment program for 16 adult females, age 18 and older, who have been unable to maintain sobriety despite multiple treatment episodes. Utilizing a modified therapeutic community model for individuals who cannot be maintained in a less restrictive environment, the target population include dually diagnosed (substance abuse/dependence and mental disorders) individuals whose impairments are so severe that less restrictive substance abuse interventions have not proven effective. Services are provided 24 hours a day, 7 days per week.

Utilizing a modified therapeutic community model for individuals who cannot be maintained in a less restrictive/structured environment and who meet criteria for residential treatment, the target population includes substance dependent adult females who are indigent, homeless, non-violent offenders, veterans, parents putting children at risk, and IV drug abusers

## **Stone Street Residential Treatment Center for Men**

*Co-occurring Disorders Unit:* A CARF-accredited, DCF licensed Level III long term residential program for 36 adult males, age 18 and older, who have been unable to maintain sobriety despite multiple treatment episodes. This program utilizes a modified therapeutic community model for individuals who cannot be maintained in a less restrictive environment. The target population is dually diagnosed (substance abuse/dependence and mental disorder) individuals whose impairments are so severe that less restrictive substance abuse interventions have not proven effective. Services are provided 24 hours a day, 7 days per week.

*Substance Abuse Unit:* A CARF-accredited, DCF licensed Level II residential treatment program that provides long term residential substance abuse services for 40 adult males age 18 and older. Utilizing a modified therapeutic community model for individuals who cannot be maintained in a less restrictive/structured environment and who meet) criteria for residential treatment, the target population includes substance dependent adult males who are indigent, homeless, non-violent offenders, veterans, parents putting children at risk, and IV drug abusers.

## **Family Intervention Treatment Solution (F.I.T.S)/Family Drug Court**

Provides a full range of substance abuse services for referrals from Volusia County's Dependency and Family courts. Services provided include evaluation, group/family counseling, day treatment, residential placement, case management and advocacy.

Provides aftercare housing and community support following successful completion of residential treatment. This program provides interventions which focus on reintegrating program participants into the community with strong relapse prevention and life skills.

*IPN Program (Intervention Project for Nurses):* Provides individualized services including outpatient and residential, for impaired professionals available through referral by the Intervention Project for Nurses Board.

*Jail Diversion Program:* Provides access to a range of treatment interventions, including residential and outpatient services, for selected individuals charged with non-violent criminal offenses on a fee-for-service basis. Referrals can be made by family members, attorneys or community partners. Judicial approval for treatment placement, as an alternative to incarceration, is often required.

## **Correctional Treatment Diversion Program (CTDP)**

Offers opportunities to address our community's interrelated problems of drug abuse, mental illness, jail overcrowding, high recidivism rates and limited access to care. The program offers individuals sentenced to more than 120 days in jail on drug related charges the opportunity to enter a 60 day in-jail program. Upon successful completion of this component the sentence can be amended and the inmate is eligible for release to community based treatment. While in the community, the client will continue to attend treatment and receive intensive case management and court liaison services.
